## **BSST ANNUAL REPORT 2009-2010 (MARCH 1 2009 to 28 FEBRUARY 2010)**

### **Chair's introduction:**

*Welcome to the British Shalom-Salaam Trust's sixth annual report, where we present our values and introduce the inspirational projects that we have been pleased to support this year.*

*We remain a small charity with a growing reputation for seeking to aid those groups – often small and new – that are working to promote effective, peaceful and sustaining relationships between Jewish and Palestinian Israelis, and other Palestinian communities in the Occupied Territories. We have received increasing numbers of appeals for support from these groups mainly because the humanitarian situation has worsened since the bombardment of Gaza, and also because of the growing impact of the economic recession internationally. This is in the wake of the Madoff fraud which hit some of our projects hard in 2008-9.*

*We continue to favour projects which aim to promote joint working towards a peaceful solution, while, at the same time, we have had to respond even more to the most fundamental and pressing needs - for food and medicine, for help with mental health and counselling, in getting primary age children to school safely, for summer schemes for school-age children, legal support to challenge settler encroachment – for the possibility simply to live a life of basic human dignity.*

*We need your help more than ever to assist those who respond to conflict, daily encroachments on their workaday lives, and repression with a defiant optimism, an obstinate creativity and a strong determination to live peacefully with their neighbours.*

***The projects and the activists especially the women in health and development work that we support represent a roll call of hope. They remind us that, even in these devastating times, there are still many in Israel and Palestine striving to find ways to build bridges, to live peacefully and productively in a shared humanity.***

*We continue to derive our inspiration from the late Irene Bruegel, BSST's first Chair, who tragically died 18 months ago. Irene left a substantial and generous bequest to the Trust which we are continuing to draw upon to support projects in her memory.*

## **BSST – who we are**

**THE BRITISH SHALOM-SALAAM TRUST** was established in 2004 by a group of Jews in response to the humanitarian crisis in the Middle East caused by the Israeli Occupation. We welcome supporters of all faiths and none.

The Trust aims to foster positive relations between Jews, Palestinians and other communities living within Israel's 1967 borders, in the West Bank, Gaza and Golan, and as refugees in other parts of the Middle East.

We work closely with Jewish and Palestinian Israelis committed to a just resolution of the conflict in Israel-Palestine based on equality and mutual respect.

## **Our grants policy**

The Trust is keen to include beneficiaries both within and beyond Israel's 1967 borders and in the Occupied Territories. We have also helped Palestinians living as refugees and British-based projects that aim to provide information and build understanding about the situation in Israel-Palestine.

The Trust supports projects that promote inter-communal contact, cooperation and understanding and/or help to overcome severe disadvantage. We have helped with cross- or inter-community collaboration, education, health and anti-poverty programmes and human or civil rights activities.

The Trust prioritises relatively small-scale and grassroots projects, in particular activities that may be overlooked by major donors, offering non-monetary as well as financial aid. We actively seek out groups to work with, and maintain on-going contact with them. Where possible, we visit, to gather information and offer further advice and support

Many groups assisted by BSST have Israeli or Palestinian legal status similar to a British registered charity. However, BSST is equally accessible to informal associations of like-minded volunteers, whose work is enormously important, but whose organisational arrangements mean it can be difficult or impossible to secure support from more mainstream funders.

As the *Villages Group*, the handful of Jewish-Israeli volunteers, supporting Palestinian families in the South Hebron Hills and in villages near Nablus, wrote

*'We are unable to contact large funding organizations due to the fact that we are not an organization that has yearly administrative and financial reports that are required by funding agencies to get any donations from them. .... We are ready to offer the needed receipts and other measures of financial transparency as needed by the donors.'*

We publicise approved projects on our website, and we manage donations (including Gift Aid) made to us on their behalf through our 'Post Box' service.

## PROJECTS SUPPORTED IN 2009-10

The 27 projects cover:

- **EDUCATION**, including summer holiday programmes.
- **HEALTH**, including mental health schemes.
- **HUMAN AND CIVIL RIGHTS** including water, land and environmental rights.
- **WOMEN'S** projects for empowerment

*There is inevitably considerable overlap in the aims and activities of the projects that we have supported. Many Human Rights projects, for example, have an educational or training focus; many educational projects focus on girls' empowerment. Half of the education projects are for the neglected Bedouin community.*

### EDUCATION (11 projects)

1. **Bedouin Association for Education and Health Development (BAEHD) (Alkhaimah): *the girls' and women's empowerment project*** is small-scale to develop educational centres in Arab communities in Israel, especially around Taibeh. **Alkhaimah** is creating viable solutions for changing parents' attitudes (especially mothers) to their children's education. This is demonstrated in Bedouin parents sending their daughters as well as sons to the educational centres. Focusing on women as agents of change, the project aims not only to change their lives but to change the attitudes and behavior of the entire of the Bedouin community. BSST sent **£5,000**. <http://www.baehd.org>
2. **Centre for Blind Bedouin Children in the Negev:** This agency was established to improve the life chances of the 50 children served by the Centre who are either blind or have very impaired vision. It aims to provide the children with education, skills and emotional support. Until 2000, most blind Bedouin children in the Negev received little if any education or any other form of developmental encouragement. Our funding enabled the Centre to buy more specialist equipment for their Technology Room (e.g. braille printers, computers and visualization accessories, with specifically designed sensorial stimulators). BSST sent **£1,500**.
3. **Negev Coexistence Forum for civil equality and strategies of peace and development (DUKIUM)** has a specific workshop project, in the unrecognized Wadi El Naim village in the Negev, run by volunteers to help develop photography for Bedouin children. The aim is for Bedouin children to develop their own pictures to understand co-existence. The project volunteers also work with the Arts Faculty at Ben-Gurion University in the Negev. Having supported some of their work in previous years, we supported their application to extend these workshops. We sent **£2,000**. [www.dukium.org](http://www.dukium.org)
4. **Learning Enrichment Programme for the Children of Umm al-Kheir** which comprises two extended family clusters of Palestinian Bedouins in the South Hebron Hills. Schooling tends to be disrupted partly because of hostile behaviour from a nearby settlement. Two teachers from the community have offered their services to tutor children at weekends, not just in Maths and English, but in "fun" subjects such as painting, drama and storytelling. An overall improvement in school work has been reported and funds were requested for a further year. We sent **£2000**.
5. **Villages Group in the South Hebron Area: School transportation for the Palestinian children.** This is a volunteer group of Israelis who have established a transportation system to enable the schoolchildren to go to and from school safely since the separation Wall and the proximity of settlements to Palestinian villages cause huge disruption to the daily lives of Palestinians. This has been particularly acute for schoolchildren, who have to negotiate long

circuitous routes to school as well as suffering settler violence. Many children have stopped attending school because of these problems. Funding has enabled a bus and driver to take the children to and from school and provides employment for the driver. We provided **£5000** (including a very generous donation from an anonymous donor).

6. **Villages Group in the South Hebron Area: School transportation for the Palestinian children.** We received a heartbreaking email in January 2010 to say that the new elementary school located in the middle of the cave dwellers area of South Mount Hebron had lost its transportation car as a result of the Israeli army interference, jeopardising the opening of the school second semester. We sent an emergency donation of **£1000** towards the purchase of another vehicle.
7. **Hope Flowers School:** This multi-faith school on the outskirts of Bethlehem continues to thrive and expand. (We have supported the school from our inception). They are now putting many resources into their **learning disabilities department**, which provides not just a higher teacher-pupil ratio but also specialist counsellors and social workers. BSST has agreed to fund 10 scholarships for children with learning disabilities. **\$6800** sent as well as some funds raised directly by the school. 8. **Centre for Creativity in Education & Cultural Heritage (CCECCH) or the Interreligious Coordinating Council in Israel (ICCI)** has been working for almost 20 years to establish and maintain programmes that bring together children, parents, grandparents, and teachers of Arab and Jewish school communities. ICCI works with youth, women, and religious leaders to promote Jewish-Arab coexistence and peace-building projects. Safe environments are created where participants can meet and enjoy coming together to get to know each other through exploring the *folklore* of their different communities. BSST has supported several projects, largely in and around Jerusalem, over the last 4 years. This year we supported a small-scale project to work with a boys' elementary school from Sur Baher. **£2,000** was sent. [www.icci.org.il](http://www.icci.org.il)
9. **Rachel Corrie Football Tournament 2009** in Gaza: a request was received for football boots. **£500** sent
10. **Summer Games 2009 in Silwan and Al-Azariyah in the West Bank** are the annual, free of charge summer camps organized for hundreds of Palestinian children, run by Palestinian, Israeli and international volunteers and take place during the months of July and August. BSST donated **£2500** <http://www.summergames2009.org>
11. **Lewis Herrington maths without chalkboards project** around Nablus. This volunteer applied for funds to continue the project he initiated, training Palestinians in teaching camps. BSST gave **£100** and forwarded additional donations via our postbox service. <http://blogs.warwick.ac.uk/lewisherrington>

#### **HEALTH (2 projects this year specifically on health)**

12. **The Freedom Theatre in Jenin Palestine** set up a **Yoga Beats** project to bring yoga into the conflict zone and develop an international focal point by sending yoga teachers to Palestine over 3 years (in Jericho, Ramallah and at The Freedom Theatre, Jenin). The aim is to train local Palestinians as yoga teachers and benefit a group of young men and women from the community and incorporate yoga in the Freedom Theatre's Acting School project. This programme will form an important part of the students' curriculum. We gave **£3000**.

13. **The St John Eye Hospital Group in East Jerusalem:** to meet the increased need to treat detached retinas, to avoid blindness, in the aftermath of the recent conflict in Gaza, ensuring that those who have been affected in this way are treated free of charge. Dr. Keren Haas, an Israeli Ophthalmologist who studied the technique at the Hadassah Medical Centre said: *“There are no political boundaries between doctors and patients, when a person is in need, no matter who the patient is or where he comes from, it’s my duty to respond to the need.”* £1500 sent.

#### **HUMAN and CIVIL RIGHTS (11 projects)**

14. **Susya Community Utility Centre:** This project, *run in conjunction with the Villages Group*, provides an energy source to allow the 100 family members of the Shineran family living in Susya (south of Mount Hebron) to develop a capability to make and market milk and cheese from their sheep and goats. The project built a solar powered energy source to complement the existing wind turbine to ensure that the villagers would always have sufficient energy to power the business refrigerators. BSST sent \$2,500.
15. **Bustan Qaraaqa (Green Intifada)** is an initiative which has established a grassroots environmental movement in the Occupied Territories, which addresses the problem of water shortage, food insecurity and waste management. It is the beginning of a network of organisations, working together for social transformation which has established an experimental farm to develop low cost and replicable techniques for sustainable living and food production, and provide support both for community groups and farmers’ initiatives. 16. **Humans Without Borders:** the organisation provides essential assistance to Palestinians, such as transportation from the West Bank and Gaza for hospitalization and treatment in Israeli medical centres: transportation by taxi to and from hospitals in Israel if volunteer drivers are not available, providing phone cards for families to keep in touch with relatives, organising summer camps for Palestinian children, assisting Palestinian farmers maintain their crops and orchards. 17. **Leadership Development and Community Empowerment (Jama’ah) in Baqa-Jatt**, an Arab town in the municipality of Haifa. This group, founded in 2007, aims to promote social and political change through *peaceful community activism, through training young men and women to be the leaders of the future*. The project sought part funding from BSST to deliver training to 100 participants to promote social justice, human rights and universal human values, gender equality and peaceful conflict resolution. BSST gave £3000.
18. **Public Committee Against Torture in Israel (PCATI)** is a social change organization that works through public and civic engagement and legal advocacy to reach out to the full range of Israeli society to enable shared dialogue on human rights, the inviolability of civilians during conflict as a supreme value and infusing democratic values in public discourse. PCATI requested support for a specific project to embed an educational programme for 14-17 year olds to develop a curriculum to debate issues against the use of torture and develop human rights. BSST sent £3,000. <http://www.stoptorture.org.il/en>
19. **Sadaka–Reut: Arab Jewish partnership: “Community in Action Programme”** trains Palestinian and Jewish youth in forms of civil action which address the differences and conflicts within Israeli society and works towards redressing injustice and inequality. This project trains young people in campaign skills, team work, non-violent direct action, dealing with conflict within groups and other skills for appropriate civil action. It is a group which not only encourages communication and conflict resolution between Palestinians and Jews, but is preparing them quite concretely and effectively for realistic action. BSST sent £3000. <http://www.ammado.com/nonprofit/sadaka>

20. **Yod Bet Heshvan** is an Israeli organization promoting the establishment of Modern Orthodox institutions based upon principles of tolerance and pluralism. The project is called *Orthodox Media Watch: combating racist, anti-Arab and anti-democratic statements in the Orthodox media*. The name of the organization is the Hebrew date when Prime Minister Yitzchak Rabin was assassinated and the organization has been working to combat racist and anti-Arab statements in the religious Jewish media, through schools and taking a public stand against incitements to racial hatred and violence. BSST sent **£3,500**. [www.12heshvan.org](http://www.12heshvan.org)
21. **Win-Win Jerusalem** is a organisation based in East and West Jerusalem and the US which trains community leaders from Jerusalem's diverse populations in leadership and conflict resolution. BSST offered postbox facilities. <http://www.winwinjerusalem.org>
22. **EMEK Shaveh, East Jerusalem** is trying to combat the use of archaeology in the abuse of Palestinian human rights and false claims to land rights. BSST sent **£3000** [www.alt-arch.org](http://www.alt-arch.org)
23. **IPCRI (Israel-Palestine Centre for Research and Information) Peace Education workshops**. BSST offered postbox facilities and gave a donation of **£250** <http://www.ipcri.org/>
24. **Leo Baeck Education/Amnesty International Human Rights school in Haifa**. This Human Rights – Friendly Schools Project, an international youth leadership programme of enormous significance, is managed, supervised, coordinated and monitored by the Amnesty International Secretariat Human Rights Education Team. BSST gave **£1000** and forwarded a donation via our postbox facility.

#### **WOMEN (3 projects)**

25. **Committee for Jewish-Arab Economic Development (CJAED)** organized a weekend event in Spring 2009 for Palestinian or Arab women's economic empowerment through seminars and activities to support them running small businesses. The events took place in several locations in Israel but based around Hertliya where the CJAED is based. BSST sent **£1,000** [www.cjaed.org.il](http://www.cjaed.org.il) or [www.jasmine.org.il](http://www.jasmine.org.il)
26. **Jenin Cultural Centre Project**: targets 20 women both from the Jenin area and behind the Wall with clear social and economic needs. An agricultural engineer oversees the training of the women to engender practical skills and self-reliance in food production and also help with marketing. A "safe box" or kitty for the women and their families who have critical social and economic difficulties enables them to take part in the training and become self-sufficient. BSST sent **£5000**
27. **Shiraa Association for Development** is a Palestinian civil development NGO which has established an Embroidery cooperative that employs women from the Deheishe Refugee camp in Bethlehem. The project is to support developing a commercial relationship with international tour groups. BSST sent **£1165**

## TRUSTEES & PATRONS

BSST's trustees have extensive voluntary organisation experience and in-depth expertise on the situation in Israel and Palestine. Its Patrons include eminent human rights specialists, rabbis, actors and directors, authors, academics, philanthropists and leaders in the voluntary sector. (see Appendix 1)

## FINANCE, ADMINISTRATION & VOLUNTEERING

In its sixth year, the *Trust's* income was over £150k, nearly all from individual donations and Gift Aid, plus some additional funds from the estate of our first chair, the late Professor Irene Bruegel. This enabled charitable expenditure of over £113k to be made.

Administration and other non charitable costs were minute – less than £500.

At the same time, volunteer labour contributed to the *Trust* is estimated to equate to some £17k. Thanks in particular to John Sharp whose work in carrying out our audit proved invaluable, and to Lee Robinson for her ever sensitive and committed design services.

## APPENDIX 2

### **BSST guidelines for applicants**

BSST is a small grant-giving charity which focuses on projects which:

- are relatively small scale
- are often community-based and informal
- involve practical collaboration between the various communities living in Israel/Palestine
- address human rights, educational, cultural, health, social care and anti-poverty issues

In particular, we are keen to help **new** and **developing** projects that may be overlooked by major funders.

For the most part, we help projects which are directed towards Palestinians, Jews and others living in Israel, and Palestinians living in the Occupied Territories. However, we do sometimes assist educational activities within Britain which are designed to build understanding here of the situation in Israel and the Occupied Territories.

**For groups that seek a grant from BSST, it is essential to read and comply with its guidelines**

### **BSST PROGRAMMES**

#### **GRANTS**

Mostly we donate between £1000 and £3000 and even give as little as £100. However grants very rarely go above £5000.

**Large organisations or those that need more than £5000 are unlikely to succeed with an application.**

#### **EMERGENCIES**

Where extreme need arises suddenly, we may make an emergency appeal. Then we do not apply our normal rules about the size of donations or organisations that we help.

#### **'POST BOX'**

As well as direct financial support, we offer a 'Post Box' service to groups and organisations that do their own fundraising in Britain, but which do not have charitable status here. We can receive donations and collect Gift Aid on their or their support group's behalf. Gift Aid increases the value of donations by 28%

## APPENDIX 3

### How to help *BSST*
